From the rotunda, one looks out across Lewis Bay to Yarmouth.

It was here on Lewis Bay, in Hyannis Harbor and on Nantucket Sound that President Kennedy swam and sailed. His presidential yacht, the Patrick J., was a familiar sight on summer weekends.

The inscription on the pool rim inside the railing is from one of President Kennedy's speeches...

"I believe it is important that this country sail and not lie still in the harbor."

The Great Seal of the United States was commissioned by sculptor Agop Agopoff (1905-1983) to create a resin master for the Great Seal of the United States to be installed at the Kennedy Memorial, located on Ocean Street in Hyannis. Dedicated on July 8, 1966 by the citizens of Barnstable to commemorate their fallen president and neighbor, the Memorial features a granite wall with two bronze sculptures overlooking a reflecting pool and the sea President Kennedy loved to sail. The president's profile medallion adorns the stone wall facing the sea and great seal medallion faces Ocean Street.



Museum, 397 Main Street, Hyannis, MA 02601

This Memorial, very simple in design but powerful in its serenity and beauty, has become a tranquil haven for travelers the world over. Dedicated in 1966 with Senator Edward M. Kennedy in attendance, the Memorial is now the responsibility of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Trust Fund Committee. Visitors to this seaside memorial, not far from where John Kennedy spent his boyhood, now number in the hundreds of thousands, and from all walks of life.

The Memorial was planned by the townspeople of Barnstable as a place where a person might rest for a moment at peace with himself and his thoughts.



The architect was Donald Durrell of Falmouth. The JFK medallion, the only one of its kind in existence, was sculpted by Agop Minass Agopoff
